
HIGH AWARDS

BRONZE, SILVER, AND GOLD



- The Girl Scout Bronze Award is for Girl Scout Juniors, girls in 4th – 5th Grade
- Girl Scout Bronze Award to be finished and turned in by September 30 of the last year girls are registered as a Junior.
- As of October 1, 2018, Bronze Awards are Leader reviewed and Leader approved.
 Paperwork does not need to be submitted to council. If troop would like to be recognized at our Girl Recognition Ceremony in April/May they will provide a summary of the project during registration.

- Girl Scout Bronze Award Projects are Take Action projects that include:
 - Addressing the Root Cause of the issue (Why does the idea matter? What is the change being implemented?)
 - Sustainability of the project? (What can the project do to make a difference?)
 - Measurability of the project? (Who will this project help)

Root Cause

- This is the "why" of every issue. It is what lies beneath the surface of a problem, takes a deeper dive with in-depth observation, questioning, and awareness.
- Community Service is easily visible to the eye the Take Action Projects address the root causes, which are often hidden, but affect a much larger group and make a much bigger impact





- 7. Spread the word.


















- The Girl Scout Silver Award is for Girl Scout Cadettes, girls in 6th – 8th Grade
- Girl Scout Silver Award is to be finished by September
 30 of the last year girls are registered as a Cadette.
- As of October 1, 2019, GSESC will no longer require a Pre-Approval for the Girl Scout Silver Award. Silver Award is Leader reviewed and Leader approved.
 Paperwork does not need to be submitted to council. If troop would like to be recognized at our Girl Recognition Ceremony in April/May they will provide a summary of the project during registration.

 - Sustainability of the project
 - Measurability of the project





- 2. Identify Issues you care about.
- 3. Build your Girl Scout Silver Award team or decide to go solo.
- 4. Explore your community.
- 5. Pick your Girl Scout Silver Award project.
- 6. Submit your Pre-Approval to GSESC and develop your project.
- 7. Make a plan and put it into motion
- 8. Reflect, share your story, and celebrate.











- The Girl Scout Gold Award is the highest and most prestigious award that Girl Scout Seniors and Ambassadors can earn.
- The Gold Award allows Girls to make a difference in their communities and beyond.
- Gold Award Girl Scouts are challenged to change the world and make Global Connections.
- The Girl Scout Gold Award is for Girl Scout Senior and Ambassador, girls in 9th – 12th Grade
- Girl Scout Gold Award is to be finished by September of the last year girls are registered as a Ambassador.

- Girl Scout Gold Award Projects are Take Action projects that include:
 - Addressing the Root Cause of the issue
 - Sustainability of the project
 - Measurability of the project
- If troop would like to be recognized at our Girl Recognition Ceremony in April/May they will provide a summary of the project during registration.

- Be a Registered Girl Scout
- Have completed:
 - Silver Award and 1 (Senior or Ambassador Journey) or
 - 2 Journeys (any combination of Senior and/or Ambassador Journey, up to your aged level)
- Girl Scout Seniors and Ambassadors wanting to start their Gold Award Project must do one of the following:
 - Attend a Gold Award Lock-in/webinar

SCHOLARSHIPS

- Currently offer two Scholarships
 - Mary Dean Brewer Gold Award Scholarship
 - I x \$1000 per year for up to 3 additional years
 - Geraldyne Zimmerman
 - 2 x \$2000
 - GSESC Scholarship
 - 2 x \$2500

GERALDYNE ZIMMERMAN SCHOLARSHIP

- The purpose of the Geraldyne Zimmerman Scholarship is to help provide financial assistance in higher education for a graduating senior Girl Scout from Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina. A one-time scholarship payment of \$2,000 will be made directly to the recipient's university or college upon acceptance and admittance to either South Carolina State University, Claflin University, or Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College.
- DEADLINE for application is March 15, 2024.

ELIGIBILITY

- To be eligible for the scholarship the Girl Scout must:
- Be a current registered member of Girl Scouts for at least four continuous years (including senior year of high school).
- Be a registered Girl Scout of Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina at time of initial application and maintain continued adult Girl Scout membership throughout scholarship period.
- Plans to attend South Carolina State University, Claffin University, or Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College.
- Submit a copy of letter of acceptance to chosen college or university with application.
- Maintain an overall GPA of at least 2.5 (on a 4.0 scale) in high school.
- Submit a copy of high school transcripts.
- Have received a composite score of at least 900 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or a composite score 19 or more on the American College Test (ACT).
- Submit complete application with required documentation by due date.
- Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina employees are not eligible for this scholarship.

MARY DEAN BREWER GOLD AWARD SCHOLARSHIP

- The purpose of the Mary Dean Brewer Scholarship is to help provide financial
 assistance in higher education for a graduating senior Girl Scout from Girl Scouts
 of Eastern South Carolina. An initial scholarship will be awarded in the amount
 of \$1,000 and is renewable for up to three (3) years in the amount of \$1,000
 annually.
- DEADLINE for application is March 15, 2024.

ELIGIBILITY

- To be eligible for the scholarship the Girl Scout must:
- Be a registered Girl Scout of Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina at time of initial application and maintain continued adult Girl Scout membership throughout the scholarship period.
- Have earned the Girl Scout Gold Award (or currently working on the Gold Award with a completion date of September 30 of current membership year). If Gold Award is not successfully completed and awarded, scholarship will be paid out to runner up (if more than one applicant), otherwise no scholarship will be paid out.
- Submit a copy of letter of acceptance to chosen college or university
- Maintain an overall GPA of at least 3.25 (on a 4.0 scale) in high school.
- Submit a copy of high school transcripts.
- Submit complete application with required documentation by due date.
- Renewal is contingent upon recipient maintaining full-time student status, 3.00 GPA, and submitting the renewal form each year (up to 3 times). Application due by July 15, 2023.
- Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina employees are not eligible for this scholarship.

GSESC SCHOLARSHIP

- The purpose of the GSESC Scholarship is to help provide financial assistance in higher education for a graduating senior Girl Scout from Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina. A onetime scholarship payment of \$2,500 will be made directly to the recipient's university or college upon acceptance.
- DEADLINE for application is March 15, 2024.


- To be eligible for the scholarship the Girl Scout must:
- Be a current registered member of Girl Scouts for at least four continuous years (including senior year of high school).
- Be a registered Girl Scout of Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina at time of initial application and maintain continued adult Girl Scout membership throughout scholarship period.
- Submit a copy of letter of acceptance to chosen college or university with application.
- Maintain an overall GPA of at least 2.75 (on a 4.0 scale) in high school.
- Submit a copy of high school transcripts.
- Submit complete application with required documentation by due date.
- Girl Scouts of Eastern South Carolina employees are not eligible for this scholarship.
